Message for the Month

Let me start by asking you a question. How would you characterise your prayer life? Non-existent? Sluggish? Fair to middling? Accelerating? Heavenly? Perhaps you can think of a more suitable word!

Generally speaking, most of us could improve on our prayer life, me included. It is, of course, one of the primary ways we communicate with God and deepen our relationship with Him. And yet, so often it seems to get squeezed - much to our detriment. I'm reminded of the hymn *What a friend we have in Jesus* and, in particular, of the opening lines:

What a friend we have in Jesus All our sins and griefs to bear What a privilege to carry Everything to God in prayer

Oh, what peace we often forfeit Oh, what needless pain we bear All because we do not carry Everything to God in prayer

During Lent, we're going to remind ourselves why prayer is so very vital and explore how we can re-invigorate our own prayer life, by looking at different kinds of prayer and at different ways of praying.

For a little over an hour every Tuesday afternoon and Thursday evening, a small group will be meeting in church to work through a stimulating and interactive prayer guide. The Lord's Prayer will provide the basic structure and each week we'll explore a different section to help open up a different way of praying.

There'll be a short video, some questions from God's word, time for discussion and crucially, time to pray. More details can be found on page 3. However you describe your prayer life at present, you are very welcome to join us.



Lent

To complement our small groups, we're also going to be exploring prayer in our Sunday morning services. The book of psalms is often said to contain the range of human experience and mark the changing seasons that characterise our relationship with God. Each week, we'll be looking at a different psalm to see what it can tell us about a different aspect of prayer and in turn, how that can help nourish our relationship with God.

It's often said that Lent is about taking things on as well as about giving things up. I hope as we commit to this new season of prayer and of praying, that we will grow in our relationship with God and so see His presence and power manifest in our life, in our church and in our community.

Observing Lent

This month sees the start of Lent, the 40-day season of penitence, self-examination and fasting running up to Easter. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for 40 days and taught His disciples to fast: 'when you fast.' (Matthew 6:17).

The spiritual discipline of fasting involves missing one or two meals during the day, refraining from TV, alcohol or social media, and identifying the things that get in the way of our focus on God. What are the benefits of fasting?

The act of giving something up expresses my desire to put God first in my life. It shows me the things that I depend on rather than God, so that I can surrender 'my idols' to Him. It encourages me to have a deeper hunger and dependency for God. It gives me space to focus on God for His strength, provision, and wisdom resulting in a more intimate relationship with Christ: 'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.' (Matthew 5:6).

Fasting enables the Holy Spirit to reveal my true spiritual condition, leading to brokenness and repentance, and a transformed life along with a heart that is more attentive to and dependent on God.

Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines, eg: joining a study group, 'random acts of kindness', giving more time to prayer and Bible study or



solitude, and reading a Lent book. Whatever you do, make Lent count this year!

'Jesus takes it for granted that His disciples will observe the pious custom of fasting. Strict exercise of self-control is an essential feature of the Christian's life. Such customs have only one purpose - to make the disciples more ready and cheerful to accomplish those things which God would have done.'

The Sermon

Sunday 13th February Speaker Ben King

Theme Into the Deep Luke 9 vv 1 - 6

Launching out into the deep might speak to you of things that might be very scary and risky, but we want to look at what is going on as an adventure with God; He wants us to join on an adventure with Him in the coming year.

The passage from Luke where Jesus sends out the disciples, He gives them a clear commission and authority, He promises them power, and just before they set off He tells them He does not want them to take anything with them but to rely on His provision. In verse 6 it says that as they step out in faith and obedience, when they launch out into the deep, He does wonderful things, the Good News is boldly proclaimed, and the sick are healed.

Three things to note:

- 1. Jesus gave the disciples a clear commission: to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal the sick. We need to listen to and discern what God has called us to do. It is important that we read God's word and pray and listen to what He wants. And when we are as clear as we can be as to what God wants us to do, step out in faith.
- 2. God is faithful: He is on this adventure with us. It is the nature of the God we worship and serve that when He tells us to do something He will be with us, and we can trust Him. It can give us great confidence to take steps of faith He is calling us on.
- 3. God will equip us for the adventure ahead: we not only have God with us but He will give us the tools to do what He has called us to do. He anoints who He appoints. In the passage in Luke, Jesus gives the disciples power and authority before He sends them out; He was equipping them with a divine power so they could do what He was asking them to do.

He tells them not to take anything, so they rely on His provision, protection, and power, and not to put their trust in any human or worldly thing. Possessions and relationships can slow us down and distract us from the purpose God has given us.

Ash Wednesday

2nd March - Ash Wednesday, a good time to admit you are sorry

Have you done something which haunts you? Which makes you feel restless and defensive, every time you think of it? Why not deal with it this month, and put it behind you? Whatever your mistake has been, consider what the Bible has to say to you:

'I have not come to call the virtuous but sinners to repentance' (said Jesus). (Luke 5 v 32)

'Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon. (Isaiah 55 v 7)

'Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.' (Joel 2 v 12-13)



The Persecuted Church

North Korea

When the authorities in North Korea discovered that Bae (not her real name) and her husband owned a bible they were sentenced to a lifetime of backbreaking labour in a remote village.

Bae spends the day working in the fields. She has to meet her work quota of crops. If she has any time for a short break, she heads for the woods. The mushrooms and plants she forages help stem the gaping hunger in her belly – otherwise she only gets to eat meagre rations. Like everyone else in her village, Bae is close to starving. The authorities give them just enough to stay alive. It's partly a punishment, and partly a reflection of the terrible

food shortage in North Korea.

If you saw all this, you'd be appalled. But you'd have no idea this isn't Bae's *real* work. That starts at night. When she and her housemates cover the windows with blankets, light a small candle and sit in a tight circle, Bae gets out a book. Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God," she reads. This is Bae's real work. This is the North Korean underground church.

Open Doors estimates there are around 400,000 Christians in North Korea, but they have to completely hide their faith. There is absolutely no freedom of religion or belief in any faith. The authorities decide everything about the lives of the North Koreans, where they live, what they do and even what they think.

The region Bae has been sent to is more like a prison than a farm. She does not have any freedom to make decisions about her life, and the roads out are closely monitored and guarded. Unbelievably, Bae did once manage to escape. When she arrived in China she was able to find shelter in a safe house.

Prayer and Action

Brother John is an Open Doors field worker whose ministry at a safe house involves supporting North Koreans like Bae with food, medicine and fellowship. Food aid is particularly vital, as even North Koreans who are not exiled like Bae face extreme shortages - North Korea is on the edge of another famine like the one that gripped the country in 1990's. The prayer and gifts of Open Doors supporters are sustaining 60,000 North Korean believers with food and medical help.

It was a joyful experience for Bae to find fellow-ship in the safe house, she is so used to leading her underground church in whispers, aware that being caught might mean death. In the safe house all that changed, she sang worship songs and prayed loud prayers, she read the bible openly with fellow believers and experienced fellowship in a way that is impossible in North Korea. There are still many risks in China, but they do not compare to the ones faced back home.

Bae was offered the chance to stay in the safe house but she refused and returned home with food, medicine and a precious bible which she shared with her underground group of believers.

Please pray this prayer shared by Brother John:

Thank you to God who loves North Korea; you are always with North Korean believers when they suffer, you feel their pain. You comfort them and give them wisdom to survive. You provide their daily bread.

God, the North Korean church have been surviving for a long time, they rely on you in their difficulties. Use them to transform North Korea. Let them be a voice to the world and share the gospel to the world.

Let us be obedient to God's calling, as supporters and missionaries let us be part of God's ministry. We praise and worship the God who never gives up on the North Koreans. Amen

Christian Basics

Christian Basics: Why the Cross?

The cross is a picture of violence, yet the key to peace;
a picture of suffering, yet the key to healing;
a picture of death, yet the key to life;
a picture of utter weakness, yet the key to power;
a picture of capital punishment, yet the key to mercy and forgiveness;
a picture of vicious hatred, yet the key to love;
a picture of supreme shame, yet the Christian's supreme boast.

The cross really is the key to everything! Although a horrifying instrument of torture and death, it is also a symbol of love and peace. On the cross Jesus died to deal with the problem of our sin and defeat the powers of death and evil. He identified with our sufferings and set us an example of self-sacrificial love.

As Peter writes, 'He Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by His wounds you have been healed ... Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God' (1 Peter 2 v 24, 3 v18). Jesus died in our place on the cross and took away our guilt, to pay the full penalty for our sin. Access to God's presence is now open to all, symbolised by the Temple curtain being torn in two from top to bottom. The barrier between us and God was torn down in order 'to bring us to God'.



Jesus is the bridge providing access between us and God. 'If Jesus Christ is to be our Saviour then He must be able to place a hand upon a pardoning God and another hand on a penitent sinner and draw them together in an act of reconciliation' (Bishop Handley Moule).

Word for Today

Where there is strife, sow seeds of peace

For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work.

James 3 v 16

When a well-known pastor was asked by a sceptic, 'Do you believe there is such a thing as a real devil?' he smiled and replied, 'Have you ever been to an annual church business meeting?'

Seriously, if you have been a church member for any length of time, you know that strife rears its ugly head in the family of God just like it does everywhere else. Paul and Barnabas, a brilliant ministry team, allowed their differences over John Mark to separate them to where they could no longer work together. Later Paul changed his mind, but the die was already cast. He appealed 'to Euodia and Syntyche. Please, because you belong to the Lord, settle your disagreement. And I ask you, my true partner, to help these two women, for they worked hard with me in telling others the Good News' (Philippians 4:2-3).

Strife hinders our prayers, takes our focus off lost souls, and makes us ineffective in our ministry. We must learn to respect each other's talents, perspectives, and positions instead of envying them. In other words, learn to disagree without being disagreeable. The Bible says: 'Where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work. But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, and easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace' (James 3:16-18). God blesses peacemakers (see Matthew 5:9), so when strife arises in your church, make it your mission to sow seeds of peace!

Eco Page

Did you know these contain plastic?

If you are concerned at the amount of plastic in the environment, some things that contain plastics are not so obvious....

Chewing Gum

Most chewing gums are based one a single use plastic and contain polyethylene (yes the same one used to make plastic bottles); there are some that use a tree sap and are both plastic free and biodegradable.



Teabags

Many tea bags are heat sealed using polypropylene which does not break down in your compost heap. You can get tea bags that are stitched, which are inevitably a bit more expensive, or you could switch to loose leaf tea.

Aluminium Drinks Cans

Most aluminium drink and food cans are lined with a plastic resin to stop the contents corroding the can. Usually it is bisphenol which is actually classed as toxic to humans.

Glitter

Glitter is made from a combination of aluminium and plastic, so anything with it on cannot be recycled. It is also found in cosmetics and craft materials. It is possible to find biodegradable glitter, or otherwise to do without.

Till Receipts

The shiny thermal paper used for till receipts also contains bisphenol, so cannot be recycled because of the risk of transferring the chemical to other items.

Sunscreen

72% of sunscreens on the market contain micro plastics to help bind it together, coat the skin and make it waterproof, but it then washes off into the sea. There are some brands that are plastic free, so it is worth searching for them.



This tradition has been passed down to us today!




Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter - so let the countdown begin!
