

Message for the Month

This picture of the crucified Christ sits in my study. It's by the Spanish artist Salvador Dali and depicts Christ on the cross over Port Lligat in northern Spain.

It's a striking picture in itself. But in the approach to Holy Week and Easter, it takes on a special resonance. At this time of year, the crucifixion is a particularly powerful reminder of the extravagant love of God - a love so deep that in Jesus, God willingly took our place on the cross and died in our stead.

The fact that Christ hangs over a small fishing community also reminds me that Jesus has died for all peoples everywhere. No one is excluded. As is often said, if you had been the only person on earth, Jesus would have died for you.

As we prepare to celebrate the highpoint of the Christian year, be assured that God extends a personal invitation to you to draw close to Him. He invites you to take your place at the Last Supper, to walk the way of the cross and to marvel at the empty tomb. These are the events that define Christianity, without which there would be no Christian faith. These are the events that millions of people will celebrate worldwide - events that give us our reason for being, unite us a church and proclaim the hope that we have in Jesus of new and everlasting life. So may I encourage you to respond to God's invitation and to step into this wonderful story afresh. However familiar or unfamiliar you are with it, God wants you to be part of it – He wants you to meet with Jesus and to receive His love so that you might also come to live life in all its glorious fulness. Easter Eve



Easter Eve is the last day of Lent. It is the day between Good Friday and Easter Day, and represents the one full day that Jesus was dead. It is a day of quiet reflection and anticipation for Christians worldwide.

In the Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican, and Methodist traditions, Easter Eve lasts until nightfall, after which the Easter Vigil is celebrated, marking the official start of the Easter season.

What did Jesus do on that one full day in the grave? Christian understanding varies on this.

The Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox and most mainline Protestant churches teach that Jesus descended to the realm of the dead on Holy Saturday, to save the righteous souls who died before His crucifixion.

The catechism of the Catholic church calls the descent "the last phase of Jesus' messianic mission," during which He "opened heaven's gates for the just who had gone before Him." Often called "the Harrowing of Hell," the dramatic image of Jesus breaking down the doors of Hades has proved almost irresistible to artists, from the painter Hieronymus Bosch to the poet Dante.

But some Protestants say there is little scriptural evidence for the detour to hell, and that even Jesus' own words contradict it. For on Good Friday, Jesus told the Good Thief crucified alongside Him that "today you will be with Me in Paradise," according to Luke's Gospel."

"That's the only clue we have as to what Jesus was doing between death and resurrection," John Piper, a prominent evangelical author and pastor from Minnesota, has said. "I don't think the thief went to hell and that hell is called paradise."

The Bible says little about the interlude between Jesus' death and resurrection. Churches that teach He descended to the realm of the dead usually quote 1 Peter 3:18-20. "Christ was put to death as a human, but made alive by the Spirit," Peter writes. "And it was by the Spirit that He went to preach to the spirits in prison."

Mothering Sunday

Thanking two kinds of Mother on 10th March

Mothering Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent, is the day for honouring our Mother Church, and has been celebrated since the Middle Ages.

Mother's Day is an annual day to honour our mothers, and it began in America in May 1907.



In the US, Canada, Australia and Mexico, Mother's Day is still held in May. In Britain, Mother's Day is held on Mothering Sunday, so the two days are often merged in people's minds.

If you ask Google for ideas of how to be nice to your church on that day, you won't find much. But if you want to be kind to your mother that day, you will be spoilt for choice. High on all the lists are suggestions for taking her to lunch, giving flowers, a card, or paying for her to have a day doing something she loves.

Whatever you choose to do, probably the best thing to give your mother must surely be yourself: some time and some love. Remind her of the funny and touching stories of your childhood and thank her for all the things that she did for you. Give her some good company and show her some gratitude. Let her know that you love her and appreciate her.

Remember that the Commandment 'Honour thy father and mother' was the first commandment that came with a promise of blessing on you, if you obey.

PCC Summary

A summary of the PCC Meeting held on the 29th January 2024

The main discussion points and decisions were:

- \cdot The 2023 accounts were presented and approved by the PCC with some minor amendments.
- The 2024 budget projects a deficit that may need to be covered by reserves. Spending on development was identified as a factor contributing to this.
- \cdot In response to this, the 2024 stewardship campaign was discussed, finalised and approved.
- · Requests for finance for youth work proposals were approved, including a subscription to youth resources, purchasing a second TV, tickets for a youth conference, and funding for an upcoming Messy Church event.
- · An update on the growing number of new members of the church who attended the recent welcome event was provided, along with the positive feedback from it that had been received.
- · The APCM meeting date was set for Sunday May 5th at 10.30 am.
- · Arrangements for the building's use as a polling station on 2 May were accepted.
- \cdot Safeguarding proposals for small groups meeting in church were presented for further prayer and reflection.
- · An update from Deanery Synod about lay training and support was provided.

How to Give Regularly to St. Mark's

Many thanks to those who give to St Mark's, and in particular for the responses to the stewardship campaign.

The most convenient way to give regularly (monthly, quarterly, or annually) to St Mark's is to use the Parish Giving Scheme (parishgiving.org.uk). This uses direct debit from your bank account, with an option for an annual inflationary increase in the amount you give. You can change the amount you give, or cancel your donations, at any time. If you are a UK income tax payer, you can opt in to the Gift Aid scheme, whereby the value of your donations to St Mark's are increased by 25p for every £1 you give.



Yemen

Courageous faith has been the theme of Saleh's life, since he bravely told his father that, whilst studying, he had been exploring Christianity, only to discover that his father was already a follower of Christ! He had hidden his faith from his son, which is a common practice in the region, where people can face extreme persecution if their child accidentally reveals their faith.

Saleh and his friend would stand in front of their local mosque and tell people about Jesus. They became known as the 'crazy guys', such was their boldness. In Yemen it is illegal to convert from Islam to Christianity, and accusation of apostasy can lead to the death penalty.

Wherever Saleh went he told Yemenis about Jesus, including in a refugee camp in a nearby country. "I became known as the person 'who knows Jesus,'" he says. "There were some deep conversations and many people there came to know Christ". One day, as Saleh was travelling to a training seminar, he was arrested at the airport. The authorities tried to bargain with him, offering to recruit him as a spy. Although he refused he was released.



With the majority of believers unable to gather in Yemen, Saleh decided to set up a house church network, but started getting death threats. "If we sit at home and do nothing we would be safe" Saleh says "But what kind of Christians would we be if we were not risking our life for others to know Life?"

Prayer and Action

Saleh's brother Issam and his close friend Mussa were travelling to a group of new believers who wanted to be baptised. Because Saleh was known to the Yemeni authorities, they decided it was safer if he did not travel with them: "I was in constant contact with them throughout the entire journey," he says. "One day, they messaged me, telling me they had boarded the bus and were en route. After that text, I lost all communication with them." The police had boarded the bus and arrested Issam and Mussa for their Christian activities. Saleh was worried that he and others were particularly vulnerable, now that the authorities had their names and contact information on Issam's and Mussa's phones. He went into hiding, fearing for his life as threats were made, and they were trying to get Issam and Mussa released.

For two months, Saleh hid in a safe house in Yemen. "Those were indeed difficult days for me," Saleh remembers. "There were days when I was hopeful and strong and other times when I felt weak, guilty and depressed. It was during those dark times when I felt God's presence with me." God answered the prayers of the church! After about eight weeks, Issam and Mussa were released from prison. "God did a miracle," Saleh says. "He changed the heart of a person of influence who initially wanted them dead. This man eventually helped them to get out of jail.

With the help of Open Doors partners, Saleh currently serves about 70 families in Yemen. He is able to provide meeting spaces for Christians, provide medical help and transportation, give out food packages, conduct baptisms, train leaders and help set up essential trainings, including trauma counselling, persecution preparedness, and discipleship.

Praying with Saleh





Church of England News

After an individual attacked a mother and her children in Clapham some politicians and media commentators criticised the role of churches in individual asylum claims. The individual responsible, who police believe to have committed suicide, had claimed conversion to Christianity in support of his application.

The Bishop of Chelmsford, Bishop Guli wrote an excellent article for the Telegraph. In the article, Bishop Guli said:





persecution and my brother was murdered. I know that behind every statistic is a human story and I have a sense of the real trauma that many asylum seekers have experienced.

Christians are called to follow the example of Jesus who throughout the Bible focuses his love and care on the most vulnerable and marginalised people in society.

Commentators this week have largely ignored the fact that churches do this by helping disadvantaged people of all backgrounds – including asylum seekers – to eat, to sleep, to worship, to find shelter and to be connected to the services which can support them. As a Christian leader I make no apology for our involvement in supporting people who are often deeply vulnerable and traumatised.

But churches have no power to circumvent the Government's duty to vet and approve applications – the responsibility for this rests with the Home Office"

Word for Today

Prepare yourself

Make the valley full of ditches

2 Kings 3 v 16

All things don't come to those who *wait* but to those who *prepare*. There is a great illustration of this in 2 Kings 3. As part of God's strategy for defeating the Moabites, God told the Israelites to dig a ditch and He would fill it with water until it became a mighty river. They did, and as a result they experienced a spectacular victory. But don't miss the point here. God said, *'When* you have dug the ditch, *then* I will fill it!' (see v. 17). God can use anybody, but He doesn't; He uses prepared people.

Moses lived to be 120. His first forty years were spent in a palace, his second forty years were spent in a wilderness, and his last forty years were spent fulfilling his God-given assignment. That's two-thirds of his life in preparation! What happens when you're not prepared? Things you hope *won't* happen, do. Often the dividing line between winning and losing is preparation! Singing, 'When you wish upon a star,' won't make your dream come true — you have to prepare yourself! Paul's ministry begins with the words, 'Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?' (Acts 9:6). Whereupon God takes him into the desert for the next three years to teach him and prepare him for his ministry.

Whether your vocation is sacred or secular, you have to know what it will cost in terms of time, effort, and resources, and prepare for it. 'Any enterprise is built by wise planning, becomes strong through common sense, and profits wonderfully by keeping abreast of the facts' (Proverbs 24:3). So, the word for today is – prepare yourself.

Care and Concern

Where is the most generous place in the UK?

The fundraising website GoFundMe has praised the British public, as recent figures show that it receives a donation every second of every day.

The generosity of the British can even be broken down into regions.

Last year Manchester was the most generous place in the UK, with 43,135 donations, while Liverpool (36,739), Brighton (19,641), Lisburn (11,122), and Saint Albans (10,474) came in second, third, fourth and fifth respectively.

This past year, many British donors have given to the victims of conflicts and natural disasters, from Ukraine to Syria, Turkey to Morocco, not forgetting those impacted by the various storms that battered the UK itself.

One notable success was for victims of Storm Babet, whose homes were flooded in Chesterfield. The fundraiser, organised by a team at Lifehouse Church in the town, raised more than £92,000, from a total of 1,600 donations.

All in all, the UK was ranked as the third most generous country in the world per capita, with more than four million donations made last year.

Tim Cadogan, chief executive of GoFundMe, said the organisation has now celebrated its "billion-pound milestone" of donations raised from the UK since its inception in 2017, and he estimates a quarter of a billion pounds was raised on the platform in 2023 alone – which he said were "incredible numbers".



How do you give? On page 5 our treasurer talks about how to give to the church, but the principles are the same to any giving; you can make a one off payment, or give regularly by standing order or direct debit. If you are a tax payer most charities appreciate you gift aiding your giving. Most charities now have a website with a page on how you can donate.

Stewardship of the Earth's Ecology

Christians should extend their stewardship to the care for God's Creation through prayer, living simply, public witness, campaigning and mutual encouragement.

Some Christians favour a more biocentric approach, but others seek to retain an emphasis on humanity while incorporating environmental concerns within a framework of Creation Care. Christian environmentalists emphasize the ecological responsibilities of all Christians as stewards of God's earth.

The US Catholic bishops point out in their statement, Renewing the Earth, as stewards, "we seek to explore the links between concern for the person and for the earth, between natural ecology and social ecology. The web of life is one."

Organisations such as Christian Ecology Link and A Rocha UK are looking at finding alternative ways of being good stewards, in a campaign of 'Joy is Enough' https://joyinenough.org.

A brief summary of the themes:

- The big transnational questions of limiting resource use and waste production and cutting emissions.
- Reform of the financial sector; changing national economic goals and how we
 measure progress; investment in low-carbon economic activities that employ
 people in ways that contribute meaningfully to our well-being.
- Tackling inequality in our society and promoting work-time reductions and work sharing to challenge the myth that we can only solve unemployment through growth.
- Promoting conditions that can make more possible close family and community relationships; challenging consumerism.
- The imperatives in scripture and theology for this new kind of economics, and their implications for the churches' mission.



Rules of living well after 60

The King is 75. Last year he did 516 engagements, and before his recent diagnosis for cancer, he had no intention of slowing down. Instead, he was keen to be 'back up and running' as soon as possible after his prostate operation. Was he right?



"Absolutely he was – you shouldn't slow down," says Sir Muir Gray, 80, former chief knowledge officer for the NHS. "Ageing exists as a normal biological process but until the age of 90, it has little effect on your ability to look after yourself, engage with others or get about independently. In fact, paradoxically, as we get older, we need to become more active – physically and mentally. Ageing doesn't make you feel old – disease and loss of fitness will."

Of course, getting older does involve some loss of energy. But slowing down a bit is never something to be ashamed of, and getting enough rest is the very cornerstone of leading a good life. Exercise is also crucial as we get older. Focus on the four Ss: stamina, strength, skill (balance), and suppleness. Maintain your stamina by brisk walking every day for 30 minutes.

When you are ill, get up again as soon as you reasonably can. Otherwise, you are at risk of 'deconditioning syndrome', a physiological decline where muscle strength can decrease dramatically if you are over 70.

Thoughtfully review of your personal life-balance. Try to find the 'sweet spot' between activity and rest. Gray advises: "If you're only doing activities, you are inevitably going to burn out. But if you only rest, you will become sedentary and you're more likely to fall ill, feel disconnected and lonely."


Finally, don't run on a hamster wheel of someone else's making. This Lent, before God, rethink your real purpose and calling in life. And live it!


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

Onelife Youth Conference




We had a great time taking some of our young people to St. Paul's Church, Hammersmith to the Onelife Conference.
