Message for the Month

After the joy and celebration of Easter, it's very easy to leave the empty tomb behind as we look forward to the rest of the church year. It would though, be a mistake to forget the enduring significance of Easter. CS Lewis once said: 'I believe in Christianity as I believe that the sun has risen: not only because I see it, but because by it I see everything else.' Without Easter, there would be no Christianity. Easter changes everything and by its radiant light, we see and understand everything else.

In the here and now, Jesus' resurrection shapes who we are and informs how we live. His resurrection also guarantees everlasting life in the world to come for all those who trust in Him. So, let's remember to keep on giving thanks for the empty tomb and all that it signifies for us and for everyone, everywhere. Easter really does change everything.

Later this month, we shall be revisiting the work we did on spiritual gifts at the end of February. It will be a further opportunity to consider our own calling within the life of St Mark's and to develop our shared leadership initiative.

It strikes me that Easter is significant here too. Jesus' resurrected body exuded new life. As the church, we too are the body of Christ. Jesus wants His new life to abound in and through us as we work together for His glory, and He asks us to open our hearts and lives wide open so that can happen.

It also strikes me that if we are hesitant about playing our part in the life of the church or fight shy of exercising our gifts, then we can take heart because the same Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead lives in us (Romans 8:11). In other words, we play our part in the life of the church with God's sovereign power working in and through us. What an encouragement for us all!

So, may I encourage you to approach the work we'll do together on spiritual gifts with hope and confidence, knowing that we do so in the power of the risen Christ. And let's continue to remember that Easter changes everything because Jesus brings renewed hope and the fullness of life in this world and the next.

Easter

The Treasure of Easter!

It's amazing what treasure can be unearthed with metal detectors! In this season of Easter, let's rediscover the greatest unburied treasure of the Resurrection.


The Apostle Peter reminds us that God '*has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade.*' (1 Peter 1: 3,4). What does he say about this treasure?

On the one hand, it is the *reason for hope*. Peter was writing to Christians in Asia Minor (modern day Turkey) who faced persecution under the Emperor Nero. In an uncertain world we know that Jesus suffered, but by His resurrection has secured eternal life for us. This inheritance not only guarantees life now, but also for eternity, as it *'is kept in heaven for you'* (4). Do we share this confidence? D.L. Moody, the 19th Century American evangelist, spoke of the time when people would read his obituary: *'Don't believe a word of it! At that moment I shall be more alive than I am now'*.

On the other hand, this treasure is a *source of joy*. This unburied treasure fills us *'with an inexpressible and glorious joy, for you are receiving the end result of your faith, the salvation of your souls.'* (8,9). We face all kinds of trials in our lives, but God uses them to refine our faith and character, *'These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith – of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire – may result in praise, glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed.'* (7).

We reflect this treasure by developing the Jesus' character and becoming more holy, obedient and loving.

'Christmas is the promise, and Easter is the proof'!



The Easter Glow

For three years Jesus had held the tiny band together, through journeyings, storms and opposition. And now – following a public trial and execution – He was gone.

Take away the dominant figure, and an organisation can quickly crumble. Take Theudas, an earlier messianic claimant. Once killed, his 400 devotees melted away. Then there was Judas the Galilean. When he, too, was removed, the movement scattered.

Now, it was Easter Day. Here were two disciples walking to Emmaus. As far as they were concerned, their leader was dead. The 'scattering' process had already begun. It had started on that fateful Thursday evening of Christ's arrest, when Jesus had quoted to His disciples from the prophet Zechariah: "It is written 'I will strike the shepherd and the sheep of the flock will be scattered'" (Matthew 26:31).

The dream was over. "Let's go home - back to Emmaus." Yet Luke 24 is the glowing account of the entire re-building of a worldview. As the apparent Stranger joins the two, it was like the uncorking of a bottle; the story pours out. Surely *crucifixion and the future Redeemer of Israel had nothing to do with each other!*

Then began a fascinating Bible study on the road. Evidently in their studies, the two had skipped the passages that spoke of a suffering Messiah. The Stranger says, "Let me fill in those bits for you." Now the figures of a Conquering King and a Suffering Servant begin to coalesce into a single photo fit. Then, at supper with the two, comes the familiar action of the breaking of bread, and - Why.... it's Jesus.

The disciples rush the seven miles back to Jerusalem. They can't keep the glowing news of the risen Christ to themselves!

If Jesus had not been bodily raised from the grave, the demoralised movement – like those of Theudas and Judas the Galilean - would have folded within days. And you and I would never have heard of Him!

A summary of the PCC Meeting held on the 4th March 2024

The main items were:

- Discussion of the results of the spiritual gifts discovery activity on 25 February, and how to use these in the church's work. More will be shared with the church family in due course.
- An update from Ben on Lent, Holy Week and Easter services and activities, deaf members' ministry, and the the Bishops' meeting for clergy who won't be using the Prayers of Love and Faith meeting on 31 January.
- An update from the Treasurer on the church's finances, and discussion in the light of the stewardship campaign.
- Updates from the Parish Worker and Churchwardens on their work, and a discussion of further aspects of safeguarding within different areas of the church's work.

Stewardship Campaign

There is encouraging news about February's 'Harvest 30' stewardship campaign. Thank you to those of you who have already taken part and renewed your giving for the coming year. If our increased giving continues for the next twelve months, then we will have eliminated half the forecast deficit of £24,000 which, of course, will put us in a much stronger financial position going forward.

Again, thank you to those of you who have already given so generously. If you have yet to complete your response form, please may I encourage you to do so - it's not too late! Even if your level of giving remains unchanged, returning your form is a way of showing that you have engaged with the campaign. If everyone returns their form, as I hope will be the case, it will be a powerful expression of faith in God's provision and so too, an encouraging sign of hope for our future. Of course, if you are able to increase your giving, then we will be even closer to eliminating our deficit completely, which would be truly wonderful.

We are surrounded by choices everyday from the moment we get up in the morning: what to eat, what to wear, what we do with our time. The whole of our daily life is full of choice, both physical and practical, of what is important. There is spiritual choice as well, which is more important and informs the other choices we make in life.

In the reading from 1 Peter 2 we read 'You are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession.' In God's economy it is very much the first shall be last and the last first. God does not stand as an appointed team captain choosing the ones who are perfect or popular. In fact quite the reverse; in Ephesians 1 v 4 it says 'for He chose us in Him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in His sight.'

Why has He chosen us? Put simply, it is because He loves us, His children. He is a loving Father who knew us before we were born. In the readings we hear that we are chosen; He chose to love us, He chose to love You. No matter how unworthy we feel, nor how many times we might mess things up, God chooses us over and over again.

Jesus died on the cross because he decided you were worth it, because he loves you so much he was willing to give His life so that we do not suffer the consequences of our sins.

We are chosen to declare praise to God, not just as a Sunday thing but as part of our everyday life. When you start to praise it will get easier, for God delights when His children lift praises to Him. In God's kingdom you are an integral part of the team. In Peter Jesus is referred to as the Living Stone / the Cornerstone, and in the same verses we are referred to as living stones being built into a spiritual house. We are set in alignment to Jesus as the cornerstone, so we know it is straight and true and fulfil our purpose.

Remember that which your life and reality is bult on: the hope we have built upon is Jesus the Cornerstone.

The Persecuted Church



Vietnam

Xuan lives in a remote tribal village in central Vietnam. There is a church there, not that you would see it if you visited. "There are Christians in my area but we worship God in secret, in our homes" she says. "It is impossible for outsiders to visit us in the village because local authorities monitor us".

Xuan's love for Christ shines out in her words and actions, and it is her mission to tell others about Jesus. But this mission comes at a high price. She is known and begrudgingly tolerated as a Christian in her village, but local authorities have forbidden her from evangelising. Not that that stops her. "I do not follow their demands, they cannot stop the gospel from being shared. However I only evangelise in secret. Sometimes I visit people in their

house at night. In other cases, I set up the time to meet with those who live farther away. I drive my motorbike and gather in a less suspicious place. I do this because I love them."

Xuan is a member of the Hmong tribe, who became a Christian after God healed her and her child from illness through the prayers of a Christian man Toma. But not long afterwards, Toma was expelled from the community. Xuan and another woman were the only Christians who remained. "We were downhearted, but it did not stop us sharing the gospel" Xuan remembered. "Everyday more and more people came to know Christ, but the local authorities were also quick. They know all of those who converted, they tried to punish us, to kick us out of the village but we were unyielding, we stayed in the village, no matter what." In Xuan's patriarchal society, the authorities punish women who convert to Christianity by first targeting their husbands. They force the husbands to leave them. If they refuse to leave them all the government subsidies like food, education, and livelihood will be cut. This is what happened to Xuan, but after the authorities destroyed their source of income Xuan's husband, despite not being a Christian, stepped in to stop her from being expelled from the village.

Prayer and Action

Despite the pressure against her, and the danger of her mission, many in her village came to know Christ because of Xuan's perseverance; her courage is phenomenal. "I will not forsake my mission, my calling" she said. "Even if the authorities catch me, I will let them do every thing they can to stop me, even if they kill me, I know I am going to die for the Lord."

Thanks to the prayers and support of fellow believers Xuan knows she is not alone. Open Doors partners in Vietnam help equip believers like Xuan through biblical training and financial aid. Xuan will never go back to how things were before she knew Jesus. "I found my life has changed so much after I allowed Jesus to rule my life. I know that I can directly pray to the Lord and He will answer me, I know that my Lord is alive."

Please pray:

"We do not know what the local authorities will do to us in the future but I really desire that we can worship the Lord in the open" says Xuan. Pray with her that believers in her village can build a church.

Xuan's husband and children are not yet Christians; she asks "Please pray for my husband and the two children to become followers of Jesus."

Violence against Christian in Vietnam has increased this year. Ask God to protect believers and change the hearts of their persecutors.

Safeguarding independence: next steps discussed by General Synod

Sadly the Church of England has had to grapple with the record of historical sexual abuse and various measures have been talked about at the General Synod over a number of years.

At the most recent General Synod, the synod voted on the next steps following the publication of independent reports on safeguarding from barrister Sarah Wilkinson and Professor Alexis Jay, former chair of the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse, IICSA.

The next steps include setting up an internal team to engage with Diocesan Safeguarding Advisors/Diocesan Safeguarding Officers and others in dioceses and cathedrals. A survivor and victim focus group will also be set up, to hear the views of victims, survivors, and their advocates on the proposals.

Synod also voted to support apologies, expressed by the Archbishops, to survivors impacted by the matters described in the Wilkinson Report, and to apologise to all members of the former Independent Safeguarding Board.

St Marks has been proactive in following the guidance issued with regard to safeguarding. Janet Bone is currently our safeguarding officer and is working closely with the diocesan safeguarding team, our churchwardens, and our minister to ensure all the procedures and training are in place. Safeguarding is an agenda item on every PCC meeting to provide oversight.

How to enrich and strengthen your relationships

But the fruit of the Spirit is . . .

Galatians 5 v 22

You can enrich and strengthen any relationship by developing and demonstrating the fruit of the Spirit. The Bible speaks about being *filled* with the Spirit (see Ephesians 5:18) and *walking* in the Spirit (see Galatians 5:16). To be 'filled' with God's Spirit means you're a receptacle, whereas 'walking' in the Spirit means you're a dispenser – a vessel God can fill and pour out into the lives of others. 'What's this "fruit" you're talking about?' you ask. The Bible describes it this way: 'The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control' (Galatians 5:22-23).

Look carefully at these nine different character qualities. The first three – 'love, joy, peace' – are *atmosphere-changing fruits*. As you yield to the Holy Spirit, He will throw a wet blanket on the unkind words you may want to say. He will build a fire in your heart that will bring warmth to a cold atmosphere and love to a bitter, revengeful atmosphere.

The next three fruits – 'longsuffering, kindness, goodness' – are attitude-changing fruits. Each of us has the potential to have a bad attitude. God sometimes lets us go through difficult situations to reveal what's really inside us. When we see our own helplessness, weakness, and despair, it causes us to cry out, 'God, I need you!'

The last three fruits – 'faithfulness, gentleness, self-control' – are *attribute-changing fruits*. Through the Holy Spirit, you have strength and ability that you can't attribute to anyone but God. And you have peace that transcends human understanding (see Philippians 4:7)




Baptisms: Because we are a growing church and people have come to faith recently, on Pentecost Sunday (19th May), the baptistry will be open for business!

Care and Concern

Bullying

There is no legal definition of bullying but experts agree that bullying is conscious behaviour that is offensive, intimidating, malicious or insulting and happens repeatedly and persistently over a period of time. It can include:

- Being called names
- Deliberately being ignored or excluded
- Constant criticism or 'putting down'
- Spreading rumours about you
- Setting you up to fail
- Aggressive behaviour shouting, intimidation and threatening behaviour
- Using a position of power to make you feel threatened or undermined
- Cyber bullying

Unfortunately, bullying affects lots of people and happens in many situations not just in schools, but also includes workplaces and families, but it's the way it's dealt with which makes the difference between life being tolerable or misery. Being bullied, feeling threatened or intimidated is not acceptable.

If you are being bullied what can you do?

- Keep a diary, and keep records of the harassment.
- Talk to someone you trust.
- Inform people in authority, most schools, and organisations have policies against bullying.
- Contact a third party organisations such as the national bullying help line, (you can find information about them on line) to get impartial advice and help.



All people deserve to be treated with kindness and respect, and we should try to ensure that anyone being bullied is helped and supported and the bullying behaviour is challenged.

Eating sustainably

Research has shown that if the Western diet was adjusted to be more sustainable, we may be able to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by up to 80%, and water use by up to 50%! These numbers represent a best-case scenario, but hint at just how much of an impact the food we eat has on our environment.

There's lots of ways to change our diet to be more sustainable, and reducing the amount of food waste we produce is one of them. But another big, big one is eating with the seasons. So if you're interested in using more seasonal vegetables in your cooking to reduce your carbon footprint, investigate what is available locally.

There are all sorts of delicious seasonal vegetables available to us in the UK during the spring, and all sorts of things we can cook with them!


According to Barclays, we now depend on contactless payments and smartphone technology so much that more than a fifth of young people now leave their wallets at home when they go shopping.



'Harvest 30' Fundraising


As a part of the stewardship campaign at St. Mark's this year, we were encouraged to be a part of the 'Harvest 30' campaign.


