# Message for the Month

What plans have you got this summer? Whether you're planning to reconnect with friends and family, planning a long-awaited holiday or planning for the autumn, I hope that you're also planning to take a proper, sustained rest. As things shut down for the summer and the pace slows, it's the one time of the year when we can and should prioritise it.

That said, prioritising rest doesn't always come naturally, does it? Sometimes it's much easier and more instinctive to keep working. We reason that the more we work, the more productive, more capable and more resilient we are. We feel better about ourselves.

But that approach to work is always counterproductive and ultimately self-defeating. Our mental health can suffer, we can begin to neglect our relationship with God and with others and we can often find ourselves locked in working patterns we seem powerless to break.

So, while rest is something we might not prioritise or even actively *resist*, the fact remains that we need it. After all, we were created to rest. At the beginning of the Bible, God spends six days creating and rests on the seventh. As we human beings are created in God's image and likeness, it follows that rest is also hugely important if we're to function and flourish as God intended.

Prioritising rest is also an expression of *faith* in God. Being prepared to down tools and leave things undone, necessarily means that we have to trust God that He will meet our needs and take care of everything.

Remember the story of Martha and Mary at the end of Luke 10? Martha knew that a meal needed to be prepared for Jesus and His disciples and busied herself with the cooking. By contrast, Mary sat at Jesus' feet, abiding in His presence and allowing Him to minister to her. Although Jesus knew Martha was trying to do the right thing, it's *Mary* He commends: "Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10:41-42).

And that's the thing about proper rest – rest that refreshes, nourishes and sustains. Taking time out and doing fun stuff is important. But so is resting in Jesus – soaking in His presence and inviting Him to minister to us. Summer isn't about pressing pause on our relationship with God whilst we go off and enjoy ourselves, Rather, summer is an important time to rest in Him and to invite His Spirit to renew and revive us.

So, whatever your plans this summer, please also plan to take a proper and sustained rest. As you do, I pray that you will also draw close to God and experience His refreshing, renewing Spirit, so that you might also experience His loving presence more deeply and be better equipped for whatever lies ahead.

#### Summary of the PCC Meeting 13th June 2022

At the **June PCC meeting** all the members were present and the following items were discussed:

- Minutes of the last PCC on 24.04.22 and minutes of the APCM on 15.5.22.
- The meeting also reviewed the updated Policy Statements: Data protection, PCC Privacy and confidentiality statement, Safeguarding policies and PCC roles and responsibilities.
- The Vicar's Report reviewed the Platinum Jubilee weekend and a Worship Review. Rev Ben King said he was pleased that our Jubilee celebrations had gone so well and that he had received grateful responses from both church family members and friends of the church.
- The **Parish Worker's report** highlighted plans for three Messy Church Mondays in August, Firepit Fridays, and the new Pop-up Cafe project.
- The **Treasurer's Report** highlighted the fact that there have been significant changes to the number of givers since Peter Arnold's March report. We have less income than last year, although we do have a significant amount of money on deposit from legacies. The financial standing orders were reviewed. Peter also introduced a plan for contactless giving as fewer people carry cash nowadays and the PCC agreed to the proposal.
- The **Churchwardens Report** from Mike Richardson and Sharon Yates reported that since the April meeting no work has been necessary on the building. The new outdoor furniture has been delivered and is in use. The church services were reported on and fresh expressions of church, such as Firepit Fridays are a good example of people being able to attend a different sort of fellowship. Mike and Sharon will be admitted as churchwardens at a service in St Bart's East Ham on 22.6.22. They asked for our continuing prayers for them over the coming year.
- The Safeguarding Report was delivered by Ellen Kemp and several policies were reviewed. There was a discussion about changes in the way we appoint people to volunteer roles in the church, due to revised Church of England regulations.
- There was no **Deanery Synod** report because there had been no meeting since the last PCC meeting.
- Correspondence included a letter of thanks from Christian Solidarity Worldwide for a donation made by the church. The meeting had also been sent a letter from a church member which was discussed. A letter of thanks will be sent to Tom and Barbara Ward who are soon to retire.

# **The Sermon**

Sunday 12th June Speaker Ben King

Theme What does the Holy Spirit Do?

The Spirit is Good News to us all because of who he is and what he does.

#### 1. Confirms our true identity in Christ Roman 8 v 17

The Spirit dwells within every believer, and has brought about our adoption into God's family; we are God's children, and we call him Abba father. Because of this adoption, we are co-heirs with Christ, we have the same status as Him. Our inheritance is to come, but the Spirit provides hope and encouragement here on earth. The Holy Spirit confirms our true identity in Jesus Christ. We should reflect, meditate and pray into these glorious truths, as it will shape our true identity and bring hope, freedom and life.

#### 2. Teaches and helps us John 14 v 26

The Spirit acts as a teacher, giving insight and revelation, wisdom and understanding. He can do that by illuminating the Scriptures and calling to mind Jesus' teaching. The Spirit reveals the truth about God and deepens our relationship with Him. The Spirit also guides us into all truth. The term advocate is used by Jesus for the Spirit to reflect that he is one who aids us. The Spirit also sustains and strengthens and helps us to pray. We need to think how we might need help and instruction and pray for the Spirit's guidance and strength.

# 3. Empowers and equips Acts 1 v 8

The Spirit equips and empowers us to do what Christ has taught and commanded us to do, and provides us with the gifts and skills to accomplish different tasks. He helps us to be the people God has called us to be and to develop the different spiritual gifts to build up the body of Christ. Ask yourself where do you need the Spirit's empowering and equipping? And pray for His power to fall upon you and work through you.

# **God in Science**

#### Wonder and Worship: Reflections in a Scottish Rainforest

It can be easier to notice things away from home, when we are relaxed and surrounded by unfamiliar sights in an exotic location. But sometimes the same wonders are there in our own back yard. GK Chesterton was a great advocate of intensive observation, and he invited his readers to take a fresh look at things that might be taken for granted. The rewards for this mental adjustment are great, and can feed into our worship in new ways.

I first learned to appreciate old growth forests on the west coast of Canada: the centuries-old tangle of logs and underbrush, and thick layers of moss and lichen, that provide rich resources for countless organisms. Several years later, in Scotland, I stumbled over a few acres of birch and hazel, lush with moss and ferns, and humming with insect and bird life. Fallen logs lay everywhere, vegetation grew up the trees, creepers hung down, and sunlight slanted through clearings.


I later discovered that this patch of woodland is one of the few remaining areas of old growth Atlantic rainforest, so I visited one sunny morning when I had more time to linger. The wood is home to 140 species of lichen and 100 of moss, so I found myself looking very closely at tree trunks and boulders. Each lichen is a unique relationship between two organisms: a fungus and a particular collection of single-celled algae – an example of the collaboration that is so essential to every ecosystem.

Places like this are worth preserving, respecting, and appreciating as much as a work of art or a historic city. I'm so grateful to the community that chose to preserve it, and the Creator who used such intricate and patient processes to create it. As the animals and plants around me did what comes to them naturally, I did what I was made for - thanking God for everything I saw. I found myself praising God alongside all those species of lichen, moss and trees. "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord" (Psalm 150).

There is a growing call to take both our personal devotions and our church services outside from time to time, and there are a growing number of resources to help us do this. As you go through your week, can you find one new way to appreciate your surroundings, and praise God alongside the rest of creation?

# The Persecuted Church



Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you

1Thessalonians 5:16 -18

#### Nigeria

Thousands of Christians have been forced to flee from their homes and villages in Nigeria because of attacks by militants.

Armed Fulani militants attacked Daniel's village last year while he and two other men were on night patrol. He lost his wife and five of his children in the attack. Daniel decided to leave the area with his two remaining children and is now living in a camp for internally displaced people in Kaduna state. The camp was visited by a Release International partner who provided food and other emergency resources. Daniel expressed his thanks, "We truly appreciate it and pray the Lord will bless those organisations that made this possible."

Zugwai is a wife and mother who lives in the same camp; she was forced to flee after an attack on her village. After hearing gunshots they fled into bushes for safety, but their houses were set on fire by the attackers. She

lost her home and her business, and has since been struggling for survival in the camp. She said "God has used kind hearted people to support us; it is my prayer that the evildoers who attacked us will come to repentance."

Thousands of people are now living in the IDP camps in Nigeria, where Release's partner provides basic items such as food and laundry soap; they also plan to provide medical support and run Bible based trauma healing for those struggling in the wake the attacks.

# **Prayer and Action**

Pastor Andrew vividly remembers the attack on his village, Guyakui. Fire consumed the whole village, after they all fled, whilst from their hiding place they saw the militants banging on the door of the church and homes. He prayed a specific prayer, not for safety, but for the strengthening of his faith and that of his church members, that even if they were abducted they would not deny Christ but hold firmly to their faith.

In the morning they searched for missing friends and family members, but several had been killed and all but six houses had been burnt down. What they did not burn Boko Haram had stolen. Many Christians left for the nearby towns, but Pastor Andrew stayed with other church leaders to rebuild the community and reestablish the church. He takes seriously the command to rejoice always , and collect together what they could to make a place of worship.

As soon as Open Doors heard about the attack, the local partners supplied emergency aid, trauma counselling and longer term support. The Christians in Guyaku did not just need to keep going for a few days; they needed to survive for the next generation. The gifts, prayers and God's mercy and grace mean that this can happen.

Boko Haram thought they were wiping out Christianity in Guyaku, but God had other plans. The exact opposite has happened: the church is growing and they are rebuilding a bigger place of worship.

# **Christian Basics**

# Christian Basics: What Does the Holy Spirit Do? (Pt 2)

Somebody once defined a football match as '22 people on the field desperately in need of rest, watched by 50 thousand people in the stands, desperately in need of exercise! It reminds us that church is not a spectator sport! The Holy Spirit equips us to serve God in the Church and daily life through the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

These gifts are variously described as *spiritual gifts* (1 Cor. 12:1) or *grace gifts* (1 Cor. 1:7), the latter word being used in modern Greek for a birthday present! They are love gifts from God that we cannot earn or deserve, that are open to everybody. Note what Paul says, "Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good" (1 Cor. 12:7):

'to each one': the gifts are available to every Christian. Everyone will have a different 'gift-mix', with their own particular contribution to offer.

'the manifestation of the Spirit': the gifts of the Spirit enable an invisible God to be real and visible.

As we exercise the gifts that God has given to us, in our speech or service, people will be able to say, 'God is at work here'!

'for the common good': the aim of the gifts is to build up the body of Christ and extend the kingdom of God. They are not intended to meet our own needs or reputation, but simply to serve and encourage others.

With the gifts given by God, we are able to fulfil His purposes in His world. Paul urges us to 'eagerly desire' the gifts that God has for us (1 Cor. 12:31). How true is this for me? Any present that we are given needs unwrapping before we can enjoy it. Are we doing this with our spiritual gifts?



# **Church of England News**

#### Cathedrals can 'light the way' to Net Zero

England's ancient cathedrals could be in the 'vanguard' of technological development needed for the green revolution. In fact, cathedrals could show the way in making changes for achieving Net Zero carbon across the whole Church by 2030, with a route map due for a vote at General Synod this month (July).

So says the Church of England's lead Bishop for Environmental Affairs, Graham Usher, who is Bishop of Norwich. He points out that cathedrals have an impressive track record within the heritage sector.

Many have already installed green adaptations such as solar panels, or replaced light fittings, or increased draft exclusion. Others have re-designed precincts to give greater access to green space and a chance for biodiversity to thrive. Over two thirds of cathedrals are already part of the A Rocha 'Eco Church' programme.

However, with cathedrals still responsible for around two per cent of the total Church of England carbon emissions, they need to identify more opportunities to meet the ambitious target set by General Synod in 2020. The Church of England's Route Map to Net Zero Carbon will be discussed at General Synod this month (July).





# **Word for Today**

## Jesus is the only way

'Come to me ... Let me teach you"

Matthew 11 vv 28 -29

Imagine you're a child studying astronomy. You read about the first mission to the moon and you begin to ask your teacher all sorts of space travel questions. 'What's it like on the moon?' The teacher replies, 'Well, I would guess' or 'I think' or 'Perhaps'. She's never been there. But next day Astronaut Neil Armstrong enters your classroom. 'Now ask your questions,' the teacher says, and Armstrong answers each with certainty. He knows the moon; he's walked on it. No speculation or hesitation — he speaks with conviction.

So did Jesus: 'He taught them as one having authority' (Matthew 7:29). Jesus knows the dimensions of heaven. He knows the words of the songs sung by the angelic choir. He has unrivalled knowledge of God — and He wants to share His knowledge with you: 'No one truly knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him' (Matthew 11:27).

But notice what Jesus says next: 'Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens...Let me teach you...and you will find rest for your souls' (Matthew 11:28-29). Underline the words 'Let me teach you'. 'Let me teach you how to handle your money, your marriage, and your mood swings. Let me teach you how to live the right way on earth, and how to go to heaven when you die.' And don't we need to learn? The age of information has become the age of confusion: too much know-how, and hardly any know-why. We need answers. Answers only Jesus has. 'But can I trust Him?' There's only one way to find out!

## Debt leaves you so lonely

Christians Against Poverty has warned that more people are suffering loneliness and isolation as the cost-of-living crisis pushes them ever deeper into debt.

The charity has recently reported finding clients "too worried to answer the door or answer the phone."



Before contacting CAP for debt advice and support, 60 per cent of respondents said they had felt lonely, while about 40 per cent admitted that they had not had a meaningful conversation in the past week. Two thirds said that they had no one to turn to when they had a problem.

As one client explained, CAP "definitely gave me hope that there was light at the end of the tunnel." CAP's helpline has experienced a significant rise in demand this year.

Along with free debt advice, CAP offers emotional support and life-skills courses to help people to connect with others and reduce their loneliness.

# What you say

#### Those careless words

Wise words from St James. He knew that it is easy to say the wrong thing and do a lot of damage. This happens in the home, at school or work or in church. Perhaps we sometimes think that people are too easily offended. 'Sticks and stones can break my bones, but words can never harm me.' Oh yes, they can!

Often a joke or what seems a light-hearted comment can do the most damage. Some places seem to attract a type of banter. I remember, with shame, some of the words that were used when I was at school to make fun of others. Comments about a person's private life, appearance, ethnicity, age or disability are most likely to cause offence.

In some circumstances, what is said can amount to bullying or harassment. The Equality Act gives rights to protect people

from discrimination and harassment. An employer could be legally responsible for banter that amounts to this, so if jokes or teasing goes on at work the victim could get compensation. Examples of comments which could be harassment or discrimination have included calling a person, 'gay', 'a cheeky monkey' or an 'oldie'. That is not to say every use of words like this is wrong. It is usually the context which is important.

What should the Christian do? We should be fair and not pre-judge people because of their appearance or make assumptions about them. We should gently challenge inappropriate language. We should not be abusive or offensive and be ready to apologise and forgive.
