Message for the Month

In an attempt to call school assemblies to order, I have on occasion, reminded children that God has given us two ears but only one mouth and that we need to use them in proportion! I can't honestly recall whether my words ever had the desired effect, but it seems to me that a similar principle is to be found in Scripture. Consider, for example, these words from the book of James: 'My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak....' (James 1:19).

Listening to one another is incredibly important. And so is listening to God. I don't know about you, but I can find it really difficult to discern God's voice. Sometimes I don't hear anything at all and when I think I've heard Him, I can often doubt that God has spoken anyway! I know I need to get better at listening to God.

With Lent fast approaching, I'd like to invite you to join me in learning to listen to God better. Listening to God is a hugely important and often undervalued spiritual discipline. Discerning God's voice can really take us deeper in our faith and encourage us in our relationship with God.

It strikes me that listening to God is also important in light of this year's motto: "Love the Lord your God, walk in obedience to Him and He will bless you in the land you are entering to possess." If we're to discern God's will for us in 2024 and allow ourselves to be guided by Him into the Promised Land, then clearly, we also need to listen to Him.

During Lent, we're going to be following a 5-week course based on the ancient practice of *Lectio Divina* or 'divine reading'. It's a way of reading Scripture that helps bring the word of God alive whilst also helping us to hear what God is saying to us personally. I trust that by the end of the course we will have come to appreciate the riches of Scripture more and become better at listening to God through His living and eternal word. As usual, there'll be a daytime and evening course and you can find more details on page 4.

So please do join me as we come together this Lent to listen to our great and gracious God speaking to us through His word. In so doing, may we also be reminded of just how precious we are to God and how much He desires to guide us on the path of truth and love in 2024 and beyond.

Lectio Divina course:

This Lent we will be learning to listen to God better through His word. Lectio Divina is an ancient spiritual practice – a prayerful way of reading the Bible that invites God to speak to us in powerful ways.

The Lectio Course is a 5-part series in which Pete Greig, founder of 24-7 Prayer, helps us to explore Lectio Divina and explains how it can deepen our relationship with God. Each session comprises a 15-minute video, a small group discussion and an opportunity to listen to God speaking to us. The videos are led by Pete Greig and each one features an interview with a special guest.



Course dates:

Daytime, led by Sharon - every Tuesday at 12 noon in the church (after Coffee and Chat) with a soup lunch: 20th February to 19th March.

Evening, led by Ben - 7.30pm in the church: Monday 19^{th} and 26^{th} February; Thursday 7^{th} , 14^{th} and 21^{st} March.

Statement from the House of Bishops on the ongoing War in Gaza

"We are dismayed that the place of our Saviour's birth is once again wracked by violence, death and destruction. We grieve that innocent children have been disproportionately affected by this conflict.

Of the 1,300 people killed in the abhorrent terrorist attacks of Hamas on 7th October, 33 were children. Of the 250 hostages taken, 34 were children. In Israel's exercising its right to self-defence, more than 18,000 people have reportedly been killed, over 40 per cent of whom were children. Thousands more have been injured. We re-affirm our position of last autumn (31st October) that there is no equivalence between the atrocities of Hamas against Israeli civilians, and the right and duty of Israel to defend itself. We also want to be clear that we do not believe that the devastating loss of civilian life and humanitarian catastrophe resulting from Israel's bombardment and siege of Gaza can be morally justified.

"This war has claimed too many lives and destroyed too many homes. We appeal for the bloodshed and destruction to stop. An alternative strategy needs to be found that closes down on attacks on Israel from Gaza and ends the violence and blockade undertaken by Israel.

"The Israel-Palestine conflict is more than another regional conflict, but one with both international and domestic resonances. The current war in Gaza risks sowing the seeds of the next several generations of vengeance and violence unless it is resolved equitably now. For this reason, we call on the British Government to appoint a dedicated Minister or Peace Envoy for the Middle East to work with other nations to focus diplomatic efforts and to signal a long-term commitment to support any future peace process.

"We condemn the fresh growth of antisemitism in Europe, a shameful feature of our Western Christian history that needs to be constantly rebuked. In schools, universities, on streets and in places of work and worship, antisemitism has been the root of so much racism. Once one group is allowed to be attacked, merely for religion, race or heritage it seems to open the gates of hell to all other forms of hatred.

"We condemn all those hateful voices stoking prejudice against anyone, for any reason and call on the church to walk alongside those from different communities. We also warmly encourage support for the <u>Archbishops' appeal for the Al</u> <u>Ahli Hospital in Gaza</u>. Sunday7th January 2024SpeakerRev. Ben KingThemeThe Motto Deuteronomy 30 v 16

Since 2020. our annual mottoes have revealed how God has been leading and guiding us as His people. 2020: "I am making everything new" Rev 21:5; 2021 "Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it." 1 Cor. 12:27; 2022 "Launch out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch" Luke 5:4; and 2023 "I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest." John 4:35.

Setting the context: This is part of Deuteronomy ('second law'), after the deliverance from Egypt and the Israelites have had the 40 years in the wilderness – a time of preparation and the time to 'get Egypt out of the Israelites'.


The Promised Land: So what does this phrase mean to you? It is a destination and a promise fulfilled (Exodus 6:5-8), it is a God place and a good place. It will be very different from Egypt – favour, freedom and fulfilment.

What does this look like for us? : It is an invitation to receive God's best for us, a choice that God sets before us. Deut. 30:15,19 "See, I set before you today life and prosperity, death and destruction...Now choose life." v.16 "Love the Lord your God" "We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19). We choose to love God – the greatest commandment (Matthew 22:37). How do we love God? '...walk in obedience to Him...' Choose to obey God and His will (John 14:23). Obedience saves us from ourselves and helps us fulfil God's best for us

The fruit of obedience: "...and He will bless you in the land you are entering to possess" Obedience releases divine blessing and favour, and following the Good Shepherd leads to fullness of life (John 10:10).

An initial response: To repent of disobedience and ask the Holy Spirit to kindle a new love for God. Pray that God would reveal the Promised Land to you and to us all and commit to journeying into the Promised Land. We know that God is faithful to keep His promises. Will we be faithful to Him?

The Persecuted Church



Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering

Hebrews 13 v 3

India

During 2023 Christians in India experienced physical and emotional abuse and harassment of pastors and believers, destruction of buildings, false charges and imprisonment, and the prohibition of home prayer meetings.

Most significant was the widespread ethnic violence that turned into religious persecution in Manipur in northeast India in May, which saw 60 people killed and over 50 churches burnt and destroyed.

A Release International partner reports 'Minorities in the state continue to grapple with the aftereffects of the ethnic and communal violence that erupted.'

One pastor has been unable to hold Sunday services for the last 5 months, having to conduct services by telephone. Another church, whose premises were demolished in the May attack, no longer have a place to hold meetings and the pastor is caring for his con-

gregation by visiting them individually. There are ongoing threats and persecution, but where possible pastors continue to conduct services.

More widely across India, persecution is increasing, reports Release International's local partners: 'The Indian nationalist government is complicit in all attacks on religious minorities by Hindu fanatics. Once the national elections are completed in May it is anticipated that if the current government is re-elected the situation will worsen, and it is feared that they may even change the constitution which currently allows religious freedom'. The local partners will continue to train workers, bolster the courage of believers, and appeal to governments of other nations for advocacy and sanctions.

A teenage girl fleeing the violence in Manipur has been provided with a new home, a Christian arrested on false charges of forced conversion was released after intervention by the partners, and a pastor was helped with medical expenses for injuries after being attacked.

They are thankful for all the supporters and prayer partners who have helped. As the persecution increases they are thankful for the global network of people standing with them and their workers.

Please pray

- That those being persecuted for their faith in Jesus will be strong and know that God is with them during their trials.
- For an end to the violence in Manipur and the state will be able to rebuild again. Pray that prime minster Narendra Modi would address the issue and intervene to stop the ongoing violence.
- That those in Uttar Pradesh who have the constitutional right to gather and worship will be safe in their efforts to follow Jesus
- That the pastors and workers would be faithful in their efforts to maintain the community of believers and disciple those new in their faith.
- For health and protection and provision as well as unity in the church.

Faith leaders call for change to asylum-claim system

Bishops and other faith leaders have joined forces with the Bishop of London to call on the Government to make a change in the leave-to-remain status situation for asylum seekers.

They say they want practice to match policy, for there to be better communication with asylum seekers, and for the timeframe to be extended.

While the faith leaders welcomed the Home Office's efforts to tackle the backlog in asylum claims, they expressed concern "at the number of refugees who, on receiving their leave-to-remain, are becoming street homeless."

The faith leaders said this meant a growing demand on London's churches, mosques, gurdwaras, synagogues and temples, for support with accommodation for those who have just achieved refugee status.

The faith leaders ask that Home Office to abide by its policy that refugees be given a minimum of 28 days from the date when they receive their biometric residence permit (BRP) before having to leave their accommodation. They also ask that the eviction notice period be extended from 28 days to 56, to allow adequate time to apply for Universal Credit and other benefits.

Bishop Mullally said: "Our churches are doing what they can to meet the need, and we all want to avoid further strain on our crisis systems. Homelessness increases the burden on the NHS, and has an overall impact on health, well-being, and the economy."

Word for Today

Sensing and Seeing God

'But God has revealed them to us through His Spirit'

1 Corinthians 2 v 10

The Bible says, "Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him." But God has revealed them to us through His Spirit' (vv. 9-10 NKJV). The Holy Spirit compensates for our sensory limits by enabling us to conceive things we cannot perceive with our five senses. Think of Him as a sixth sense. That sense must be cultivated, matured, and fine-tuned. And that can only happen when we spend time meditating in the Scriptures and fellowshipping with God in prayer. Until we are awakened by the Holy Spirit, we are unaware of our need for God, of the spiritual warfare that is being waged all around us, and of what God is doing all around us.

One night Jacob had a dream in which God appeared to him and said, 'I am with you and will keep you wherever you go' (Genesis 28:15 NKJV). When he awakened the next morning, Jacob said, 'Surely the LORD is in this place, and I did not know *it...*This *is* none other than the house of God, and this *is* the gate of heaven!' (Genesis 28:16-17 NKJV). Jacob went to sleep and woke up in the *same place*, but he woke up a *different person*. After his wake-up call, Jacob saw God every place he looked.

Today ask God for a spiritual epiphany. Pray, 'Lord, show me what You want me to see, teach me what You want me to know, lead me step-by-step in the path of Your perfect will.' That's a prayer God will answer!

Care and Concern

Archbishop urges Government to scrap two-child benefit cap

The Archbishop of Canterbury used his recent House of Lords debate on families and households to urge the Government to scrap the two-child benefit cap.

The two-child benefit cap means that parents can only get child tax credit or universal credit for their first two children. The cap is for the third child and subsequent children born after April 2017.

Archbishop Justin highlighted research from the End Child Poverty Coalition which stated that "removing the two-child limit would lift a quarter of a million children out of poverty."

The Archbishop went on: "The unfair penalty applied to additional children affects their educational outcomes, their mental and physical health, and their likelihood to require public support from public services later on. It is not a good policy."

"Thank you, but we should have done more" - Bishop responds to COP 28

The Bishop of Norwich, Graham Usher, lead bishop for Environmental Affairs, has been reflecting on the recent COP28. Here are some extracts of what he says:

"My hopes for COP28 were that we needed a commitment to phase out fossil fuels, make significant progress with the Loss and Damage Fund, prioritise resili-

ence building for climate vulnerable communities, and create a transition to green development pathways that is just and ambitious.

"COP28 saw some progress on these items. Like a cracked record, I say again: 'Thank you, but we should have done more.' "\$700m has been pledged for the Loss and Damage Fund, with further funding pledges for adaptation and resilience building. Both are a start, but the amounts are not nearly enough to support even the existing schemes in the pipeline to support the poorest and least resilient communities in the world who have pumped the least carbon into the atmosphere.

"While it is very significant that the words 'fossil fuels' have made it into the final agreement, it remains disappointing that the parties have failed to agree the most important pledge – the need to completely phase out fossil fuels.

"The UK Government's clear position of a phase-out of fossil fuels means it can have global moral leadership in this area. Without a phase-out of fossil fuels, there is no pathway to net zero carbon.

"The Church of England has a clear role in continuing to be a place of thanksgiving for our life in Jesus, hope for the poor, and prophetic action to care for our planet.

"I urge us all, and particularly world leaders, to remember that the pledges made at COP28 do not have to be the upper limits of our climate action. We can and must reach further. That goal must be a fossil fuel phase out and a re-centring of our priorities towards the care of creation and the poorest people."

The cost of parking at your local hospital

Have you been a patient or visitor to a hospital this past year? If so, you are not imagining it: the cost of parking there has skyrocketed. In fact, parking charges for hospital patients and visitors have leapt by £50 million in a year.

Recent NHS accounts show that hospital trusts made nearly £146 million in income from patients and visitors in 2022-3. That is a whopping 50 per cent increase from the £97 million received the year before.

There has also been a major jump in the amount hospital staff have to pay to park. In 2021-22 the staff members paid just £5.6 million, which increased to £46.7 million in 2022-23. These latest figures have been met with criticism from Royal College of Nursing, which has slammed the growing cost of parking for staff.

Newham General has limited car parking available, with spaces for Blue Badge holders. Please only bring your car if it is absolutely essential, and note that there is a charge to patients and visitors parking at Newham Hospital. There is car parking available near the main entrance of the hospital, and also directly outside the Gateway Surgical Centre. The cost of this is:

- Up to 1 hour: £2.00
- Up to 3 hours: £3.70
- Up to 6 hours: £7.00
- Up to 8 hours: £8.00
- Up to 24 hours: £16.50


At Whipps Cross parking is very limited due to building work taking place on site; if you can find a parking place the charges quoted on the website are:

Through Jesus' model of fasting and praying for 40 days and 40 nights, we can see the importance of how it helps us grow deeper in our relationship with Him.




So this Lent, what are you going to give up to make more room for a deeper relationship with Jesus?


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


